Clapping game with partner: (Begin with each clap = quarter note)
 Clap own hands, clap right partner - own - left partner
 Clap own - clap palms with partner, clap backside of hands with partner, clap palms.
 This sequence repeats throughout the song (verse and chorus).
 When players are comfortable with the sequence, change to each clap = eighth note.

Originally found in Erdei, P and Komlos, K. 150 *American Folk Songs*. New York: Boosey and Hawkes, 1974: 45, under "Liza Jane." There are numerous Offr accompaniments and vocal ostinato available.

FORMATION: Circle, hands joined, walking beat. Cake Cutter walks around inside circle.
 ACTION: All sing song. On the final beat, the cake cutter slices through the joined hands two players, who the race around the outside of the circle... shaking hands when they meet - back to their vacated spaces. Cake cutter stands with outstretched palms, facing the vacated space awaiting the tag of his hand (first bump/high five, etc.) by the winner of the race. Winner is the new Cake Cutter.

Used with very young children, this song is excellent for color identification and for providing individual attention to each child. The final word or improvised text is sung on do. One can also substitute "Lord Daniel's wife" for the child's name, e.g., "Down came Miss Nancy Reed and she was dressed in green."

FORMATION: Circle, hands joined. One child in center.
 ACTION: All circle right and sing. On the final word, the child in the center points to a child and sings the name of the color that child is wearing. The chosen child leaves the circle and walks the opposite way around the outside of the circle. Continue singing until each child has been selected to leave the circle and join hands with those walking outside the circle, thus forming a new circle. During the final performance, all children point to the child in the center and sing the name of the color he is wearing.

Possibilities for skill development among pre-schoolers and kindergartners are seemingly endless with "Engine, Engine." An "engineer" can lead the class in stepping the beat, saying "woop-woop" in head voice to get the train moving. Children can identify and perform a slow beat as the train is leaving the station and faster as it picks up speed. They can also identify and perform quieter/softer if the train is far away and louder as the train gets nearer. In later grades children can compose melodies using so and mi, for example, demonstrating a particular form - aaaa, abab, aaba, etc.

My 4-year-old nursery school students in Austin, TX (1984) added:
 Spaceship, spaceship, number nine. Flying through the air so fine.
 See it sparkle, see it shine. Spaceship, spaceship, number nine.

In 2017, my graduate students at Coastal Carolina University in Conway, SC added two more verses:
 Fire truck, fire truck, number nine, Speeding down Chicago line.
 Hear the siren, hear it whine, Fire truck, fire truck, number nine.

Sailboat, Sailboat, number two, Sailing on the ocean blue.
 See the sails and see the crew, Sailboat, sailboat, number two.
